This will be the normal informal gathering and technical chinwag at TS Terra Nova. These "B" meetings provide an excellent opportunity to chat to other members, opportunity to solve problems, and operate the club station. In the past we have also run a Morse class.

LAST MEETING:

"A" Meeting Monday 7th Feb 2000

Linear Amplifiers – David Foster G3KQR

This meeting was arranged at short notice to fill a gap in our programme and we are indebted to Dr David Foster who gave us this talk on Monday 7th Feb. His style was very good – we reckon he should have been on the stage! He held our interest all evening and was very entertaining.

I learnt that David's interest goes back to 1957 with his development of mechanical filters for the then new SSB mode. On 30 Nov 57 David had his first SSB QSO with G8SM on 3.7Mhz using his homebrew all band SSB exciter running barefoot. To get anywhere though need a Linear and so it started.

David described his approach to a Linear including choice of valve using parameters of cost, availability now, and availability in 10 years. An anecdote he used was that if one comes across a brand new box set of TV sweep valves then sell them and on the proceeds buy valves suited to the purpose. David's preferences was 811A's

rather than 4CX250's, followed by 572B's (811A with carbon anode), and then 4CX150A, 4CX250 and 4CX500.

The circuit configuration he preferred was that of Common Grid with a driven cathode I/P of low impedance, and plate O/P with impedance of a few k's. This configuration has the advantage of needing only small neutralisation. Another tip was to ensure the correct filament voltage and so the filament transformer should be in the same box to avoid volt drop.

David discussed the choice of RF choke with old ARRL handbooks being a good source of information. A 3-30MHz choke would be something like 112T of 26guage on a 3 7/8" ceramic former with circuit design to achieve 0.25Mohm series impedance.

David also discussed the virtues of a common grid 811A linear including:

- Drive required 70-100W
- Zero bias situation
- No PSU for Screen
- Loaf's along
- Inherent –ve feedback
- Low Q circuits in cathode (this stabilises transistor PA O/P's)

Another anecdote is that one should watch the plate colour though the casing holes of the Linear as **bright red** is no go, whilst dull red is go on air! Try that with a transistor linear – David did compared the two approaches and I noted the obvious one of valve linears being much more tolerant of abuse compared to transistor types.

At the end of the day the making of a linear should be well within our capabilities. David also referred us to the article in the February 2000 Radcom.

Thank you David for a very interesting and entertaining talk, and for bringing along the various examples of linears. I hope that I have accurately reported your talk. By the way I have copies of the circuits that were circulated based on the 811A (Collins 30-11 Linear Amplifier, and RCA Class B Linear – 875W O/P).

MEMBERS NEWS & ACTIVITIES

Firstly congratulations to Ron Herr with the arrival of a new "Harmonic" George some 7 weeks ago.

Secondly, I have received this piece from "Our Correspondent" re **Beacons**.

"I had a very pleasant QSO with W8VLN who told me something I had not appreciated. How many of you have looked at a list of beacons and wondered how many could be on the same frequency?

The answer is that they operate in sequence so if one wants to find out propagation for a particular country, you wait on the frequency until the prefix you are interested in comes up (or not if conditions are unfavourable). There is an additional piece of information as after the call there are three dashes of 100, 10, and 1 watt. Each sequence takes three minutes to cover the 18 beacons on CW. The frequencies are 14.100, 18.110, 21.150, 24.930, and 28.200, probably less 500Hz for tone. For example if you leave your set on 28.199.5 and within three minutes you hear ZS6D at S9 you know the band is open to that direction.

I have only tried this for a short time today, but it seems promising.

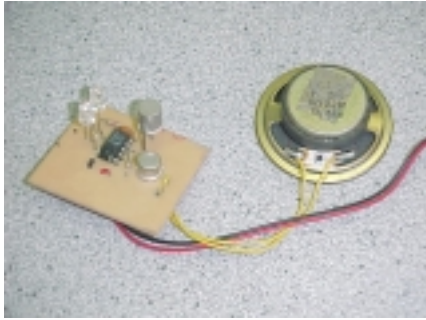

Proposals for May Construction Evening – May 8th - Repeat Request

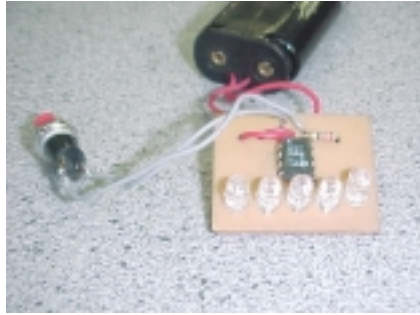

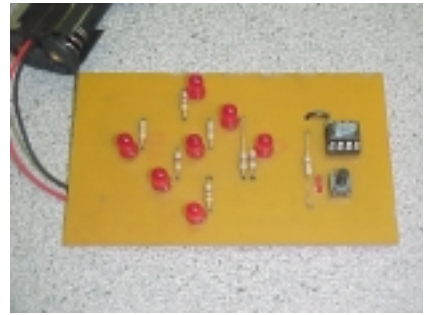

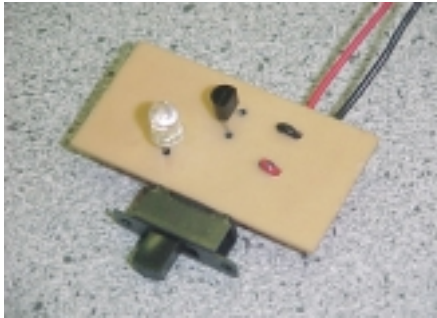

BICYCLE FLASHER



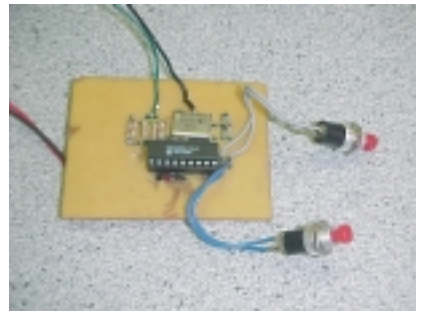
